Remembering Italo Balbo in contemporary Italy

This lecture explores the contemporary memory of one of Fascism's 'most glamorous and competent leaders', Italo Balbo. Possessed with 'immense demagogic and organisational abilities', Balbo rose to prominence in the early 1920s and played a critical role in the March on Rome, which brought Mussolini to power. It was as Air Force minister that Balbo cemented his heroic reputation, leading round-trip transatlantic military flights to Brazil (1930-1) and the United States (1933) that turned him into an international celebrity. Balbo was killed by Italian friendly fire over Tobruk, Libya, in 1940.

Since the early 1990s, Balbo has been immortalised in bronze, remembered in exhibitions, portrayed on stage, and subject to toponomastic commemoration. Perhaps surprisingly, his public rehabilitation has been driven not so much by the Italian 'New Right' as by the post-communist 'New Left' and the Italian air force (the Aeronautica Militare). The lecture will explore the reasons for this, and will argue that while Balbo has enjoyed something of a memory 'makeover', an 'indulgent memory' of the former quadrumvir has persisted through much of the post-war period.
