We offer an immersive experience with professors and students from different disciplines and universities; you will get a profound understanding of sites, artifacts, monuments, and other artworks in and around the Eternal City. Join us in our research in archaeological fieldwork, digital humanities, palaeography, epigraphy, archival skills, and/or museum practice.

Our programme is based on the idea that Rome is a perfect site to learn about the past, present, and future of human history. Rome itself is an ideal case study for a wealth of cultural and historical processes, but also a node of knowledge about (former) cultural, political, religious, and colonial networks across the globe.

Who should apply?

We encourage applications from a broad range of students and researchers associated with one of these Dutch universities: RUG, UvA, VU, RU, UL, or UU. Your curriculum does not necessarily need to focus on Rome or Italy, since we are encouraging anyone who is eager to learn and broaden their horizons to join us. We are always looking for fresh perspectives and ideas, as well as a variety of skills and expertise. KNIR courses can usually be part of your regular study programme.

Research grants

We offer grants to conduct research in Rome for your (Re)MA or PhD-thesis, your Post-Doc project, or for preparing a project proposal. If your research is related to Rome or Italy, or benefits from resources that are readily available here, there are several possibilities to spend time at the KNIR. During your stay you will be supervised by one of our staff members, and will be given ample opportunity to discuss your research with fellow bursaries. You will also have access to a varied programme of events, lectures, and extracurricular activities organized at the KNIR and other foreign and Italian institutes.

Where are we located?

The KNIR is located in an early 20th century villa at the Villa Borghese, with its own library, classrooms, laboratories, and accommodation (in double or triple rooms for courses; single rooms for longer research stays) with cooking facilities, and a private garden.
